At the Capitol

Roseville was actively engaged in the 2019 state legislative session. The city led the way in attempting to secure legislative action in five key areas:

- Authorizing cities to use existing Tax Increment Finance (TIF) District funds for environmental cleanup efforts
- Capital improvements and renovation to the Guidant John Rose Minnesota Oval
- Allowing the Cedarholm Community Building to receive an on-sale liquor license
- Municipal hotel/motel licensing
- Permitting taprooms and cocktail rooms on the same premises

Roseville's advocacy for these items provided important visibility for the five priorities. The city's backing was instrumental in bills being introduced on all five items. Hearings then took place on four of the five objectives, with the city's priority regarding TIF fund usage ultimately passing both houses and becoming law.

This legislation is critical to Roseville's environmental cleanup efforts in the Twin Lakes region of the city. The new law covers money Roseville has been collecting since 2005 and is projected to free up approximately \$2.2 million.

City Hall Parking Lot Renovation

The parking lot at City Hall is receiving a facelift this summer.

In addition to new asphalt, the project includes a complete overhaul of the water and sewer services beneath the parking lot as well as the parking lot's stormwater system.

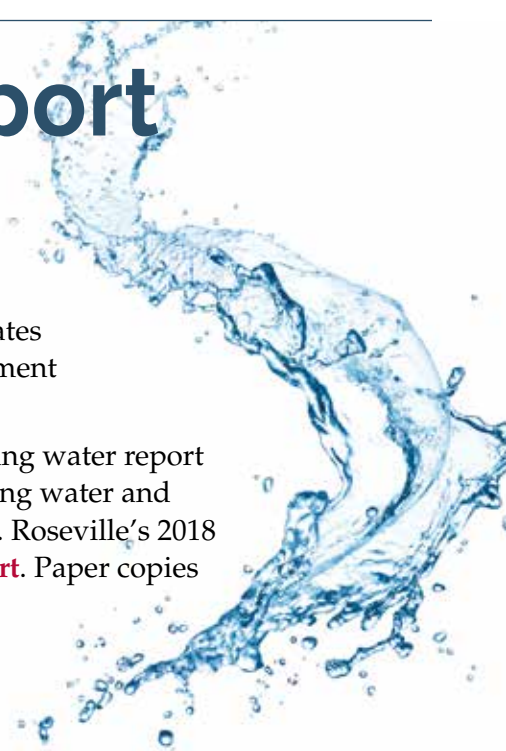
The parking lot will also be upgraded to meeting Americans with Disability Act (ADA) requirements, including new sidewalks and islands, and the main entrance being realigned to provide improved entrance and exit flow of vehicles.

The project will begin on July 9 and is expected to run through the first of October. During construction, city staff will park offsite; however, 20 spots will remain available at all times for residents and those attending meetings at City Hall.

Drinking Water Report Available Online

Safe drinking water is essential for life. The City of Roseville is proud of the water it supplies. It consistently meets United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Minnesota Department of Health regulations governing drinking water.

The EPA requires water suppliers to provide an annual drinking water report to customers. This report will help customers understand drinking water and heighten awareness of the need to protect this precious resource. - Home remodeling and additions
- Decks
- Driveways (new install or replacement)
- Garages and accessory structures
- Sheds
- Fences (in excess of four feet in height)

City Completes Solar Installation

The City of Roseville completed installation of the final two solar arrays atop the city's maintenance facility early this summer to wrap up construction on the City Hall campus solar project. The new 125kw arrays of 339 panels join those put into service in April on the roofs of City Hall and the fire station. In addition to reducing Roseville's campus electrical costs, it is estimated that the solar installation will offset approximately 141 tons of greenhouse gas emissions annually.

2020 Budget Cycle Begins



As we reach the midpoint of 2019, work on Roseville's 2020 budget is already well underway.

City Manager Patrick Trudgeon will present the recommended budget and tax levy at the City Council's August 12 meeting. The recommended budget is a comprehensive proposal that includes staff and Council recommended budget priorities and the corresponding revenue requirements to meet those goals.

In September, the City Council will adopt a preliminary tax levy and budget for 2020. State statute requires cities to adopt a preliminary tax levy and budget by September 30 for the upcoming fiscal year. Once the preliminary levy is adopted it can be lowered, but not increased.

The Council will hold additional discussions about the budget in the following months leading up to the final vote on adopting the 2020 budget and tax levy on December 2. Residents are encouraged to play a role in the process over the coming months. Keep an eye out for opportunities for making their voices heard in upcoming editions of the City News.

Census Data Guides Community Funding

The U.S. Constitution mandates a headcount every 10 years of everyone living in the United States. Every person, regardless of age, race, ethnic group or citizenship status, is counted.

Census data helps guide community funding decisions. An accurate count ensures that Roseville receives its fair share of about \$675 billion of federal dollars. For each person not counted in Roseville, about \$2,800 in federal funding is lost each year.

According to the George Washington Institute of Public Policy, allocations of federal funds to Minnesota in 2016 included:

- Education, including student loans and special education;
- Transportation, including roads and bridges, public transportation;
- Census Data Guides Community Funding Health Care, including Medicare and Medicaid, health care centers, health insurance, substance abuse treatment and prevention;
- Housing, including housing loans and energy assistance;
- Hunger, including school breakfast and lunch programs, supplemental nutrition assistance;
- Business, including loans, career and technical training, dislocated worker grants;
- Public safety, including crime victim assistance, Homeland Security grants;
- Additional programs, for a total of approximately \$15.46 billion to Minnesota in 2016.

Residents will receive information from the US Census Bureau in March of next year about completing the 2020 Census. Learn more at 2020census.gov.

Vacation Safety

Summertime is a great time to get away for some rest and relaxation, but the last thing you want to come home to is seeing that your home has been broken into. Roseville Police encourage you to take steps to protect your home.

- Let the police know when you will be out of town for an extended period of time. They will increase patrols in your neighborhood and look for anything suspicious.
- Apartment, condo or townhome dwellers, notify the property manager and ask that they keep an eye out for suspicious activity.
- Make it look like someone is home by putting lights and radios on timers. Suspend mail service or have a trusted friend pick up the mail and take care of any maintenance.
- Lock your garage, balcony doors, house doors and windows.
- Store valuables inside a locked storage area.
- Install motion activated lights to cover all entries to your home.
- If living in an apartment or other multi-tenant living arrangement, contact the property manager to report any lights that are out, missing locks or screens or other maintenance issues.
- Help keep your neighborhood safe too. Keep alert to what's happening, and if you see something suspicious, call 9-1-1 immediately.

Water Supply and Usage

Clean, safe water is vital to life. But, it's not an unlimited resource. The City of Roseville purchases its water from the Saint Paul Regional Water Service. This issue of the City News provided a link to the city's current annual water quality report for residents to review.

In January, the City Council adopted a Water Supply Plan recommended by staff to continue Roseville's water supply relationship with the Saint Paul Regional Water Service. Included in the plan are details discussing the city's conservation efforts and water rate structures designed to conserve this precious resource.

Currently, four percent of residents use 17 percent of all residential water consumed in Roseville during the summer months of June, July and August. To help the city reach its conservation targets, in September 2018 the Public Works, Environment and Transportation Commission recommend that the City Council consider adopting a third, higher-tier summer rate for heavy residential users (more than 50,000 gallons per quarter). The third-tier rate would be charged at twice the tier one rate being charged to residents who use less than 30,000 gallons per quarter.

It is expected that this conservation recommendation will be brought before the City Council for discussion this summer.

What Can Residents do to Conserve Water?

- Regularly check and repair leaks
- Replace older toilets with high-efficiency models
- Take shorter showers
- Install aerators on faucets and high-efficiency showerheads
- Wash only full loads of dishes and laundry
- Schedule irrigation wisely – lawns require no more than an inch of water per week
- Water only once or twice a week to encourage deeper lawn roots
- Turn some of your lawn into a native plant garden
- Use mulch in garden areas and around trees to reduce evaporation

Sanitary Sewer Backup Prevention

The City of Roseville has 156 miles of sanitary sewer mains. Each year, about one-third of the sanitary sewer mains are inspected and cleaned. Sewer mains that require a higher level of maintenance are cleaned annually or semi-annually. Routine maintenance helps prevent blockages and sewer backups.

In an Emergency

Imagine a devastating tornado -- downed trees, debris on the roads, ruptured gas lines or live electrical wires. Imagine a chemical spill, fire or explosion. You cannot get out of your home or cannot get to your home. What would you do? Where would you go?

In an emergency Roseville Fire and Police, neighboring communities, Ramsey County and the state, would respond; however, in a serious situation, it may be difficult or impossible to reach someone for several hours or several days. People with special needs may face additional challenges, including being able to flee to safety or to provide for themselves if emergency responders cannot reach them.

The city recommends that everyone, regardless of circumstances, be prepared to assume responsibility for their own safety and the safety of their family during an emergency.

Make a Plan

Families are encouraged to make an emergency plan and assemble an emergency supply kit. Hopefully you'll never need it, but it's best to be prepared. A plan should include your shelter plan, evacuation routes and plans for how family/household will communicate with each other.

A plan should consider the needs for all members in the household. Are there small children who need care? Is someone in a wheelchair or have medical needs? What languages are spoken?

If You Hear it, You're Near it

With improvements to the emergency weather siren system, in an emergency, sirens only sound in the direct area of danger. If you hear an emergency siren, you are in danger. Immediately seek shelter and turn to local media for information about the type of danger and steps to protect yourself and your family.

You play a key role in preventing sanitary sewer backups. To help prevent backups, please do not dump these items down the drain or flush down the toilet:

- Diapers
- Sanitary napkins
- Rags or shop towels

- "Flushable" wipes
- Garage waste products such as oil, grease, gasoline or antifreeze
- Household waste such as ashes, grease, corrosives, glass, metals, paint, poisons or solvents
- Yard waste such as sand, soil or mud

Inflow and infiltration (I&I)

Inflow and Infiltration (I&I) is another cause of sewer backups. I&I is when clear water gets into the sanitary sewer system. This occurs through cracks or leaks in sewer pipes and manholes or when sump pumps are incorrectly connected to the sanitary sewer system. During large rain events, I&I can cause the sanitary sewer system to overflow, resulting in sewer backups.

Because of the potential for inflow and infiltration to create sewer backups, City Code prohibits property owners from disposing of clear water, including water from any roof, surface or ground, sump pump, foundation drain or swimming pool, into the sanitary sewer system.

Sewer Lines

The city is responsible for repairs to the main sewer line. Property owners are responsible for sewer repairs from the home to the main sewer line. Before calling a private plumber, call the Utility Department at 651-792-7004 during regular business hours or 651-767-0640 after business hours if you have trouble with your toilets or drains. A worker will check the main sewer to see if it is working properly and notify you of its condition.

If you call a plumber and find the problem is in the main sewer line, you will still be responsible to pay the plumber for visiting your property.

Backflow Prevention Devices

There are several types of sewer backflow prevention devices. Some can be installed in the drain, others in the pipe where it first enters the home. Contact a plumbing specialist to learn more about the types of devices and cost.

If you have questions regarding the city's sanitary sewer maintenance program, sewer backup response or a specific incident, contact the Public Works Department at 651-792-7004, Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Outside regular business hours, report emergencies to Ramsey County Dispatch at 651-767-0640.



The sewer cleaning truck known as the jetter, can produce water pressure up to 2,000 psi and pump 80 gallons per minute to propel the cleaning nozzle up the sewer line. Once the nozzle reaches the next manhole, the operator pulls the hose back against the pressure, thus cleaning the section of sewer main.

Congratulations Roseville – Heart Safe Community

Congratulations to the City of Roseville. The city has been designated a Heart Safe Community.

The program aims to increase the survival rate of sudden cardiac arrest. To achieve the designation, city staff and partners taught CPR and AED awareness to almost 2,000 people, located 56+ public access AEDs and launched Pulse Point, an app to improve awareness and notification of CPR trained bystanders and AED locations.

Partners leading the efforts include the Roseville Fire Department, Roseville Area School District and the Roseville Area Senior Program. In addition Roseville's Community Health Awareness Team (CHAT) was instrumental in supporting the city's efforts to be a heart safe community.



In May, the City Council accepted the Heart Safe City designation.

Firefighter Mental Health

More firefighters die by suicide than in the line of duty. There is a stigma against seeking help for a mental health issue, especially in the world of public safety. These startling facts spurred the city to take action. In April, the City Council approved a contract with MASA Consulting to provide preventative education, counseling and post incident debriefing for Roseville firefighters.

The city wants firefighters to get the appropriate, professional and responsive support for their needs. The goal is to provide firefighters with the tools to deal with occupational health issues. The program will address spectrums within the mental health arena: critical stress, sleep deprivation, home/work balance, spousal relationships, healthy outlets for stress and other areas of concern.

The program will help firefighters who are dealing with traumatic and stressful experiences they face while on the job. The goal of this program is to be a support system to ensure Roseville firefighters have long and successful careers.



Recycling in Roseville

Roseville uses single-sort recycling. Drop all recyclables, including paper products, plastic food and beverage containers, glass bottles and jars, steel and aluminum cans, milk cartons and juice boxes in your cart. Have the cart at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your recycling day.

Recycling Tip

We all know the three Rs of recycling – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, but it's time to add two more Rs – Repair and Refuse.

Repair – Rather than throwing out a ripped or broken item repair it. Ramsey County offers free Fix-it clinics. Bring small household appliances, clothing, electronics and more to receive free assistance to disassemble, troubleshoot and fix items or look online for tutorials and learn to fix it yourself.

Refuse – With a little planning you can reduce the amount of trash that is generated. A few options include saying no to plastic bags when shopping; instead, carry reusable totes. Request documents be emailed rather than printed. When ordering a drink, tell them you don't need a straw. Stop junk mail by registering at dmachoice.org, optoutprescreen.com and catalogchoice.org.
